THE REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR END 31 MARCH 2020

The trustees are pleased to present their annual report, together with the financial statements of Renaissance Foundation, for the year ended 31 March 2020.

Objectives and activities

Renaissance Foundation was registered as a charity in 2009. Its charitable objects are set out in its governing document and these objects underpin its operational objectives. The trustees have paid due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when determining the activities of the charity.

Our mission is to inspire young people living with significant challenges to achieve their full potential. Currently, we work with three marginalised and hard-to-reach groups: young carers and young hospital patients, as well as disadvantaged school pupils at risk. The young people Renaissance Foundation helps are typically aged between 13 and 17 and live across London, although the majority are from Tower Hamlets.

We run a three-year programme focused on the needs and aspirations of each individual. As well as ongoing emotional support and mentoring, we provide practical training through workshops, and give our young people access to a range of inspirational people, events and businesses. Over time, Renaissance Foundation has built up an enviable network of relationships with high profile people from business, sport, the arts, academia and government, providing the charity with a wealth of options to use in our programmes. These activities are designed to motivate, inspire, and enable our young people to imagine and build a better future. The programme follows a progression which allows young people to build on their achievements and take on greater responsibilities year after year. We believe in giving autonomy and fostering empowerment. At a very early stage, participants are encouraged to take the lead on projects such as interviewing role models and creating Renaissance Foundation podcasts, thereby allowing them to express creativity and to develop skills away from the classroom. This is particularly important if young people have become disengaged from traditional education, helping to give them confidence in their own abilities, encouraging them to develop their own ideas, identity and aspirations, and reducing their focus on their identity as a disadvantaged person.

All participants in the charity's programme are referred by well-respected authorities. Local schools, London-based hospitals (including Chelsea Westminster Hospital and Great Ormond Street Hospital), and leading organisations supporting young carers regularly nominate young people to participate in Renaissance Foundation's programme, a mark of their trust in the foundation's ability to deliver positive change.

Achievements and performance

We are proud to have delivered a rich programme for young people over the last year. Highlights included visits to Mercedes F1, 'behind the scenes' at Britain's Got Talent, the Living Rainforest, The Queen's Club, three National Trust sites, Wimbledon, the British Film Institute, the Royal Astronomical Society and Windsor Castle. The programme also featured workshop sessions at Audible, Freemantle, Equinor, Shell Foundation and Radio One. The Norwegian Embassy again supported our young leaders' trip to the Nobel Peace Prize award ceremony in Oslo, an inspirational event which is used to reward our young people who have shown outstanding performance.

We saw further progress on funding year-on-year, from £124,399 to £178,385. We could not run the programme without the generous help of our donors, and are hugely grateful for their support.

Looking ahead, we have advanced plans for the development of our first, bespoke youth hub in Aldgate, East London. The hub will act as a drop-in centre for our young people, and provide space for inspirational workshops and individual sessions with our young people.

Additionally, the trustees and CEO have recognised that the charity is best placed to provide specialist support for two of the three cohorts of young people we currently support, namely young carers and young hospital patients. Therefore, moving forward we will focus our efforts in the aforementioned groups whilst continuing to work with schools as referral partners.

Recently, Covid-19 has impacted the charity - and the young people that we support - dramatically. We are proud of Renaissance Foundation's quick response; our inspirational sessions and workshops have been moved online, we have set up a peer support group and we are also providing emotional care and support on a one-to-one basis for our young people and their families. Successfully migrating our work to a digital setting has caused us to reflect on how we can harness digital platforms to better support young people in the future. Looking forward to a world post Covid-19, we will explore a blended delivery model that combines digital and face-to-face support, in order to maximise our impact on young people's lives.

Financial review

Increased levels of funding resulted in an increase in year-end cash from £62,016 at March 2019 to £67,519 at March 2020. We aim to hold cash reserves that are sufficient to cover at least three months of operational costs, and will work over time to increase this level to six months. The level of reserves at March 2020 anticipates investment of up to £50,000 in our new hub, the cost of which is currently expected to be substantially offset by rent reductions over the following two years.

We have ambitious plans both to develop our existing programmes and to increase the number of young people to whom we provide support. We intend to support this with continued investment in the charity's operational infrastructure, to ensure that the life-changing work and growth ambitions of Renaissance Foundation can be delivered successfully.

Structure, governance and management

Renaissance Foundation is company limited by guarantee, and its activities are governed by its articles of association. New trustees are elected by the existing board members. On appointment the new member receives an induction programme by way of one-to-one meeting with a trustee, working through a package of information, including the memorandum and articles of association, historical documents and Renaissance Foundation's business plan.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to companies entitled to the small companies exemption.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 March 2020

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (effective 1 January 2015) (Charities SORP FRS102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Legal Status

Renaissance Foundation is a charitable company limited by guarantee. It is incorporated in England and Wales and its registered address is 62 Old Nichol Street, London E2 7HP. The company meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Going Concern

The trustees have considered the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic in their assessment of the charity's ability to prepare accounts as a going concern. Because of the uncertainties surrounding the effects of the economic slowdown it is difficult to predict the impact on the charity and its members, but having taken all the factors into account, the trustees are of the opinion that the charity has sufficient resources to continue trading for the next 12 months from the date of signing these accounts.

1.2 Income

Voluntary income received by way of donations and gifts to the charity is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when received. Intangible income, such as donated professional services, is not included unless it represents goods or services which would otherwise have been purchased. Material gifts in kind are valued and brought in as income.

Grants received for specific purposes are accounted for as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.3 Expenditure

The cost of raising funds represents the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and grants for the provision of services run by the charity.

Expenditure is recognised in the period in which it is incurred.

Charitable expenditure comprises direct expenditure including direct staff costs attributable to its activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Percentages for the current year are as follows:

Charitable activities	80%
Raising funds	20%

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with the management of the charity's assets, the running of the organisation and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets are only capitalised if their value is above £500 and they have a life of more than one year.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following basis:

Office equipment	33%	straight line
Computers & electronics	33%	straight line

1.5 Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specified purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets this criteria is allocated to the fund, together with a fair allocation of overheads and support costs where relevant.

1.6 Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds, including designated funds, are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the charity's purposes and are expendable at the trustees' discretion.

1.7 Deferred grants

Grants of a revenue nature are credited to incoming resources in the period in which they meet the definition of a receivable. Grants received in advance for specified future periods are carried forward as deferred income.

1.8 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due.

1.9 Creditors

Creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors are normally recognised at their settlement amount.
